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Hotel Information & Location

The 2014 AIRUM conference will be held at the Hilton Minneapolis-St. Paul Airport/Mall of America (3800 American Blvd E, Bloomington, Minnesota, 55425, USA). Located in lovely Bloomington, the hotel is next to the Minnesota Valley National Wildlife Refuge featuring a complete Visitor Center and over 8 miles of walking/jogging trails through the beautiful MN River Valley. The hotel is one mile from the Mall of America and three miles from the Minneapolis St. Paul International airports; both of which are accessible via light rail just blocks from the hotel. Pre-Conference Workshop and Plenary Speaker:

Dr. William E. Knight



William E. Knight is Assistant Provost for Institutional Effectiveness and an adjunct faculty member at Ball State University. He is a founding member of the Association for Higher Education Effectiveness and past president, past forum chair and a past member of the Board of Directors of the Association for Institutional Research. He received the BG Best Award in 1998, the BGSU Timothy D. King Friend of Student Affairs Award in 2009, the NASPA Region IV-E Outstanding Contribution to Higher Education Award in 2010, and the AIR Outstanding Service Award in 2013.

He leads and teaches in Ball State's institutional research certificate program. His professional and scholarly interests include the impact of college on students and leadership and effectiveness within the field of institutional effectiveness. He has authored or co-authored 30 peer-reviewed and invited publications, including *Leadership and Management in Institutional Research: Enhancing Personal and Professional Effectiveness*, edited the *Primer for Institutional Research*, served as co-editor of *The Handbook for Institutional Research* and *Building Bridges for Student Success: A Sourcebook*, carried out 119 peer-reviewed and invited conference presentations and workshops, done several

keynote addresses at regional and state conferences, and served as a member of 58 dissertation and thesis committees.

He also serves as a Peer Evaluator, Team Chair, and member of the Accreditation Review Council for the North Central Association Higher Learning Commission. He has consulted on institutional research, assessment, and accreditation at several institutions. He was previously an institutional researcher and faculty member at Bowling Green State University and Georgia Southern University and an institutional researcher at Kent State University and has served as a visiting scholar at Shandong University (China) and the University of Michigan.

AIRUM November 2014 Keynote Address by William Knight The Future of IR and IE: New Roles, New Skills, New Collaborations

As demands for accountability in higher education and interest in evidence-based decision making continue to increase, the role of IR is changing. Numerous drivers of change are affecting the work that IR does, the skills we need to have, and the people with whom we must work effectively. Despite this, there is evidence that institutions are not using information as effectively as they could, and IR job descriptions nearly always focus only on technical-analytical skills, not other critical aspects of organizational intelligence. One emerging, related trend is the development of multi-function offices, sometimes called institutional effectiveness. The keynote focuses on what is often the gap in IR/IE skills sets and resources for addressing it.

AIRUM November 2014 Pre-Conference Workshop by William Knight Leadership in IR and IE: Enhancing Personal and Professional Effectiveness

Despite increasing demands for accountability and institutional improvement, there is evidence that institutional research/institutional effectiveness is not meeting its potential in leading and supporting evidence-based decision making. One reason is an emphasis on technical-analytical skills rather than other aspects of organizational intelligence. The need for "soft skills" or leadership development in IR/IE is even more critical as formerly-separate offices and staff dealing with IR, assessment, accreditation, planning, program review and the like are combined into offices of institutional effectiveness. The workshop <http://www.airum.org/conferences.html> provides real-world IR/IE examples, case studies, and other hands-on learning strategies to help participants enhance their skill sets in the areas of personal and social competency, successfully navigating campus politics and cultures, ensuring effective use of information, and career management, based upon the presenter's new book, *Leadership and Management in Institutional Research: Enhancing Personal and Professional Effectiveness*, and his leadership within the Association for Higher Education Effectiveness. AIR is in the final production stage of this new book and is currently working on an arrangement to provide a discount to AIRUM members; more information will be forthcoming shortly.

Data and Decision-Making: The Human Factor

And in a first for our annual meeting we are pleased to announce a second pre-conference workshop will be available. Dr. Leonard Goldfine from the Office of Institutional Research at the University of Minnesota and affiliated faculty member with the Organizational Leadership and Policy Development department will provide a full-day pre-conference workshop focused on understanding the nature, limits, and ambiguity of what data can (and cannot) tell you, especially in such hot-topic policy arenas as dashboards, rankings, and equity analysis.

This workshop will examine the role of the institutional researcher in relation to other key stakeholders in decision-making processes. Rather than focusing on specific statistical techniques or analytical processes, we will instead delve into the messy, non-rational, and often highly political aspects of IR we face when dealing with the intersection of data and humanity.

Gone are the days of the lonely institutional researcher working in isolation on crosstab tables. Today we must work with technology professionals, senior administrators, faculty, students, and the public at large, helping inform what data to analyze, how to collect it, how to interpret it, and how they fit into larger macro- and smaller micro-contexts. All these depend on human-to-human interactions in-, around-, and about "data." And, as IR professionals we are expected to have a working knowledge of what our data can tell us and what it cannot and be then able to communicate effectively with all the aforementioned stakeholder groups while maintaining the appearance of neutrality.

Using a combination of discussion, role-play, and humor, we will re-examine the current ever-broadening role of institutional research. We will explore the pitfalls and opportunities for data-informed decision-making using common IR task-areas such as dashboards, data definition, equity analysis, and rankings. Underlying it all, we will attempt to demystify data so that we can talk more honestly about it.

Be prepared to share your opinions and IR-related stories, laugh at the day-to-day absurdities we must face, and come to a whole new understanding of the very human nature of our field.

Continuing with our change two years ago, the price of registration for graduate students will be \$100, a \$85 discount on conference registration! In addition, graduate students are eligible to apply for the AIRUM scholarship for \$100 to cover the registration fee for attending the annual conference in November. 2014 AIRUM Conference Scholarships

The AIRUM Steering Committee is again pleased to announce that three AIRUM Conference Scholarships are available for awards of \$185 each. These scholarships are intended to cover the registration fee (but not membership) for attending the AIRUM Conference in Bloomington, Minnesota on November 6th and 7th, 2014. The goal of the scholarships is to assist individuals whose work pertains to institutional research but who have been unable to attend an AIRUM Conference due to lack of institutional support for conference expenses.

Eligibility — to be considered you must meet all three of the following requirements:

- * Be involved in work related to institutional research
- * Never have attended an AIRUM conference
- * Demonstrate that it is unlikely that your institution could provide you with the economic resources necessary to attend.

Application — a short (one page maximum) essay with the following items sent to the address below (either via U.S. Mail or by email), postmarked no later than October 10, 2014.

- * A brief description of your current duties
- * An explanation of why you want to attend the conference
- * A short description of financial need

Award — each of the three scholarships covers the base conference registration fee of \$185. (\$100 for Graduate Students)

Selection Process — all applications postmarked no later than October 10th will be reviewed by the AIRUM Steering Committee. Applicants will be notified of the Steering Committee's decision shortly afterwards. If you have already registered and paid for the conference, your registration fee will be refunded if you are selected.
